Fortunately, there are several picturesque beaches across the US where you can set up camp. The beautiful vistas of Hawaii are obviously a popular place for campers during the summer months, but you can also find excellent oceanside camps from the sea to the shining sea on land. The West Coast, from California to Washington state, is a treasure trove of camp jewels that give you excellent access to the Pacific Ocean. To the east, states along the East Coast like Maryland, North and South Carolina, Florida and Massachusetts have dozens of terrains that satisfy campers of all levels of experience. And the best part about all these places is that not only can you enjoy s'mores by the fire at night, you can also soak in the summer sun by day. All campsites listed below allow people to get close to the water or even camp right next to the surf. Some even have pitches that allow RV and campers. Check out some of these amazing beaches with affordable camps for people who want their day at the beach to never end. This state park has two main camps: Camp Hanakoa and Camp Miloli'i. Visitors can get excellent beach camping in Miloli'i, which is accessible only by boat and requires a rate of \$20 per person per night. Visitors must also obtain a camping permit, which can be submitted online. Black sandy beaches, pools with tides, freshwater caves and natural stone arch are enough to attract every tourist. Not only is this state park stunningly beautiful, but it also has some of the best camping on the beach. Visitors must obtain a permit and book, with prices between \$12 and \$18 per night. You can also rent a camper for \$18 per night (for non-segments), and cabins are available for \$90 per cabin per night. To book, visit the park's website.. You can't find a more scenic view of the mountains and ocean than in Homer. Located along Kachemak Bay, this camp is large enough for more than 100 RV and at least 25 tents. Even though it's Alaska, you won't be rude either. The camp is very close to restaurants, shops and bars. Beachfront campsite prices start at \$35, but there are many more places to explore if you don't want to be on the water. More information about the reservation can be found on the Homer Spit Campground website. are tons of Instagram-worthy places along this coastal beach park, located on Highway 1. Wright's Beach hosts 27 camps and even allows dogs as long as they stay on a stretch. Prices can range between \$35 and \$45 per night. Reservations can be made 48 hours to seven months in advance. More information can be found on the California Department of Parks and Recreation website. By far the most popular beach camp in Washington state, it's easy to see why. Rocky terrain is certainly different from a typical beach experience, and is home to several species of wildlife, including gulls, whales and even bald eagles. The 21 islands make up the Apostolic Islands in Wisconsin, and camping is available on 19. 16 islands also have backcountry camping options for people who don't mind defending themselves, or maybe just wanting a more secluded experience. Camping fees start at \$10 per night, plus an additional \$15 individual fee. More information can be found on the National Park Service website. With three miles off the coast of Lake Michigan, there's a lot to see and do on this popular camp. It has massive terrains – 297 locations in total – with tons of beautiful views, hiking trails and even ski slopes. Although the area seems secluded, visitors have noticed that you can take a short trip to a nearby town or even a local brewery. Camping fees range between \$25 and \$37 per night. Located just two hours from New Orleans, this campsite is the best way to experience the bye when you're done sauncing down Bourbon Street. It offers 49 RV places (with electric and water) and 14 tent places located on the beach. As well as enjoying fun in the sun, the camp also has fishing, crabs and hiking trails. Prices start at \$3 per person, per night. More information can be found at Reserve America. You can only reach this remote island by boat, but the trip is worth it. Visitors can explore freshwater wetlands and spot plenty of fascinating wildlife as they hike to this campsite. In addition, it has several modern amenities such as treated drinking water, showers and toilets. One drawback: you can't light campfires on the beach, but there's a firehouse. This stunning campsite is located between the idyllic cities of Charleston and Savannah. The beautiful beach offers a peaceful, secluded getaway where you can take your canine friend. Here, visitors love to dive while exploring the pristine sand and emerald waters of Bahia Honda. It is also one of the most romantic islands in the world, so it is ideal for couples who love nature. Booking prices start around \$38 per night. Reservation information can be found on the Florida State Parks website. Windsurfers and kayakers definitely found some heaven on this little camp. It's also amazing for people who like to fish or observe bird life - it's called Bird Island after all. Camping fees are \$8, or \$4 for seniors. There is a common firehouse, although grilling is also allowed unless otherwise stated. One thing to remember: it's just dry camping, which means there's no electricity or running water. Located just west of Martha's Vineyard, this two-mile beach features beautiful roses that grow wild, plenty of windsurfing and 100 different campsites. Jet ski rental in the Myrtle Beach area includes instruction and safety equipment, allowing you to cruise carelessly along the Grand Strand. Or opt for a Jet Ski tour that will bring you face to face with Other tours take you through south Carolina's pristine backwaters with moss-covered oaks, bringing you close to areas you can only reach with the knowledge of local experts. Fishing in Myrtle Beach is a fishing dream. That's because the area offers so many ways to throw a line. Head to Springmaid Pier, which holds the state's record catch for Spanish macke d'rica, or cruise the charter for a bit of fishing on the high seas. Other boats are also available to take you fishing for reef, crab and shrimp. Even if you've never made a catch before, you can try sweet or salty fishing (and then grill your dinner prize). There's just no better view of Myrtle Beach than 500 feet behind the boat, high in the sky. Parasailing companies in the area give you the opportunity to fly through the air with a bird's eye view of the entire Myrtle Beach and the open Atlantic beyond. Adhering to strict safety procedures, parasailing clothes allow up to three people to ride side by side. Take a closer look and you can spot dolphins and fish following your path. And for those who don't want to navigate the skies, boats often allow you to take a ride. Exploring the oceans, rivers and waterways of the Myrtle Beach area from there will give you a whole new perspective – and respect – of water. Myrtle Beach is one of the most affordable places to dive, and the mix of fresh and salt water, reefs and wrecks gives you a variety of opportunities to spot creatures including angel fish, barracudas and even sea turtles. For those with no experience, you can start in the pool to learn the ins and outs of diving and then decide if open water diving is right for you. Those with the previous certificate can rent their own equipment, take more advanced courses for additional certificates, or join diving on beginners or advanced sites. One popular dive site is the Billy Perry Reef system, packed with snappers, sea turtles and tropical fish thanks to a submerged tugboat and a plethron of New York City subway cars. Myrtle Beach works to preserve its natural areas and wildlife habitats. One of the best ways to get into the local flora and fauna is on an eco tour. Excursions are available by kayak or boat, depending on the clothes and place you want to explore. Go shelling to a barrier island, spot aquatic life and look for birds including herons, ospreys, eagles and blue herons. You might even spot an alligator. Many of the tours have marine naturalists as your guide, giving you a deeper insight into the ocean, wildlife and the area's history. Especially popular are dolphin tours that take you to the best possible places to watch magnificent mammals. Atlantic bottlenose dolphins are often so close they can splash you. Fun for adults and children, banana boat ride is like a tube – only better. Explosion across the waves at 30 miles per hour while you're hanging on board along with five others.
